Last year we had a special class that I found really interesting. The topic was historic monuments in China: the Great Wall, the Terra Cotta Army, and

the Forbidden City. The teacher, a Chinese professor, had a difficult time getting here, and the class had to be rescheduled a couple of times, but when it happened it was superb.



I got to thinking about the Great Wall. Its intended purpose was to keep people out.

We call ourselves WALL. What is our purpose? It's the opposite of the Great Wall: we want to bring people in. Bring them in so they can discover things. Maybe we shouldn't be WALL, but WINDOW. (WALL is a great acronym, and WINDOW is not, so we'll keep WALL, but think about the greater meaning.)

Let's make 2018 the YEAR OF THE WINDOW!






